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

I pray in a very special way that this Christmas season is a meaningful Christmas - a difference that makes our difference in our lives. The birth of Jesus breaks through all the selfishness, indifference, pain and crises of our world, bringing us hope, peace and joy. May our celebrations be mindful and inclusive to each other, as well as kind to our earth. Let the difference Christmas makes carry on in our commitment to care for creation.

AOE ECO YOUTH CAMP AT MAHAD

An Eco Youth Camp organised by the AOE took place over the weekend of 6th-7th May 2023. Fifty youth participated in the camp, accompanied by Bishop Allwyn D'Silva and Fr Sunil Godinho.

At Mahad, Fr Praveen D'Souza, priest-in-charge at Mahad, provided insights into the history and geography of Mahad, the mission work there, and the recent floods that affected the area. Through an icebreaker activity led by Leander Viegas, we got to know each other better. After having a very tasty meal cooked by local tribals, we proceeded to the main campsite - the eco-farm, which spans an impressive 45 acres. Its remarkable features include a flowing river, a crocodile-inhabited pond, 1500 mango trees, cows providing 70 litres of milk daily, as well as chickens and goats. The biodiversity on the farm was awesome and we enjoyed the serenity of the place.

On the occasion of his 75th birthday, Bishop Allwyn donated and blessed a statue of St Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology, setting it up in the centre of the *Laudato Si'* garden at the farm. Bishop Allwyn invited the youth to embrace his vision of environmental stewardship. He emphasised the power of individual actions and how these can collectively create a substantial impact on the environment. In the evening, we engaged in creative group activities, resulting in captivating presentations that caught everyone's attention. A team of generous volunteers prepared a delicious dinner of fried chicken, paneer, dal and rice using firewood. This experience tested our time management and cooking skills.

The following morning, we gathered amidst the beauty of nature to celebrate Mass. Sr Bridget Viji ACI gave us a thought-provoking talk on the seven Laudato Si' goals and encouraged us to make these our personal goals to save nature. Each group then embarked on our assigned farm duties, including weeding, picking up stones, and filling mud around the mango trees. The camp concluded with a meaningful reflection session wherein we put forth a range of ideas about the policy changes our country and city require, as well as explored career opportunities within the green economy.

Despite the hot weather, our enthusiasm remained unwavering. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Astrid Lobo and the vibrant AOE Eco Youth team, the trip was a resounding success.

In the next half of the gathering, Mr Jocelyn Dsouza and his team spoke about their experiences from the recently conducted World Youth Day at Lisbon, Portugal. He shared his learning on the Economy of Francesco, energy resources, waste management, urban farming, and being a part of God's creation. Finally, Fr Luke Rodrigues SJ (Head – AOE) addressed the participants, urging us to continue our ongoing efforts towards a Green Diocese. The AOE extends its gratitude to the Salvation Green Cell members, the Eco Youth team and all those who made the event a success.

OLVC GREEN CELL ACTIVITIES

During the Season of Creation, the Green Cell of Our Lady of the Visitation Church, Nerul organised a Eucharistic adoration themed on Creation on 15th September, with Fr Prem Arokia as the main celebrant. The adoration created a spiritually uplifting atmosphere while encouraging the congregation to practice sustainable activities. The primary objective of the adoration was to foster a deep and lasting connection with the Divine and with creation.

An e-waste collection drive was held in October 2023 to address the growing problem of electronic waste. Thanks to the active participation of parishioners, the Green Cell collected around 100 kg of electronic waste including computers, smartphones, and peripherals. The event was organised in collaboration with the Nerul Rotary Club and Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation. This initiative not only facilitated the responsible disposal of electronic waste but also raised awareness about the environmental impact of improper e-waste management.

The OLVC Green Cell also organised a stall showcasing saplings and eco-friendly products on Mission Sunday. The stall offered a diverse range of saplings, including indoor plants, succulents and plants known for their environmental benefits. Information cards provided details on each species, educating visitors about their specific ecological contributions. The stall also showcased an array of sustainable alternatives, such as vermicompost, organic plant vitalisers and bioenzyme. The event served as a platform to connect with the local community and raise awareness about adopting sustainable practices in daily life.











A YEAR OF GOING GREENER!

The Certificate Course for Eco Ambassadors in 2022 helped a group of individuals - the Ecopals - from Holy Family Church, Andheri, comprehend the impending threat to the Earth caused by global warming and climate change. Beginning with a group of just ten parishioners, we set out on a journey, taking small steps towards our goal of helping people understand the need for responsible consumption by being the stewards we're created to be. With a curiosity about our surroundings and keeping in mind two of Pope Francis' appeals - 'the cry of the Earth' and 'the cry of the poor' in his encyclical *Laudato Si*', we initiated two major conservation projects on the parish level, i.e., biodiversity management and the dry waste management programme.

Though our parish has been blessed with a good green base, not much was known of their variety and value. That's when we decided to undertake a study of the biodiversity at Holy Family Church. The first phase involved understanding all the trees on our campus. With the help of a few naturalists, the team spent days measuring the DBH (Diameter at Breast Height) and identifying the trees based on the bark, leaves, flowers and fruits. We were surprised that there are 40+ different species and 150+ trees on our campus, without including the ornamental, flowering plants, shrubs and creepers. We recorded this data in a specific format and put it up on the church website. Additionally, we had tree tags affixed on each tree providing specific information with a linked QR code which could be scanned for further details. This achievement further enthused the team to make it more interactive by directly engaging with the parishioners through Tree Walks. The first Tree Walk was on 3rd September, the first Sunday of the Season of Creation 2023. We had an excellent response with approximately 150 parishioners participating after the morning masses. The website, tree labels and the Tree Walk have generated a lot of interest among parishioners towards trees and nature at large. Our next plan is to curate a specific tree walk for our Jesus Fan Club (Sunday School children) with exciting hands-on activities.

Besides this, we initiated the parish-level dry waste management programme coordinating with NGOs that recycle dry waste in an appropriate manner. A successful e-waste collection drive was also executed and although we began by accepting only plastic and Tetra Pak waste, we are now accepting all kinds of dry waste and have even begun collection of dry waste from individual households. Moreover, we firmly believe that planting seeds of awareness, irrespective of size, will sprout and turn into a fruitful tree in due course of time. We, therefore, organised educational games for children at the Summer Fun Club; Sunday school sessions on the 3Rs, food wastage and electricity wastage for children of classes 1-10; a workshop on making Christmas decorations out of waste for the primary students; nature walks and various other workshops on microgreens, kitchen gardening and dry and wet waste management for all. We've designed an area on the campus called the Ecozone with information on herbs, birds, types of plastic, etc.

Furthermore, we've worked towards including people of all ages by seeking spirituality in nature especially through the liturgy on occasions like the World Environment Day, World Water Day, Earth Day, etc. We invited RuR to organise a workshop, primarily for housewives and the elderly. We celebrated Children's Day by inaugurating a large hopscotch patch within the Ecozone. We also had a blessing of pets on our church premises where pet owners and their pets were welcomed for a fun-filled evening. All in all, we're now a group of twenty parishioners striving to move on to level two, helping a wider audience be aware of, and take on their duty of responsible stewardship towards all of Creation.

ECO TOGETHER

In Orlem there is an RMC plant operating amidst many housing societies, spewing out cement dust and critically affecting the health of citizens. The Environmental Cell of Orlem (ECO) rose to the occasion and started a signature campaign, gathered over 8,000 signatures, and submitted this to the various concerned authorities. Additionally, to further help deal with the rising dust pollution, we distributed various types of flowering, evergreen, air-purifying plants and fruit trees. All the plants and trees were taken by our parishioners leaving us with requests for more. ECO's endeavours to care for Mother Earth continued with a weekend campaign comprising a Beach clean-up and Treeplantation to celebrate the Season of Creation. After a time of prayer in the Church of Our Lady of the Sea, 60 volunteers set off towards Erangal Beach for a clean-up activity. The group then planted 58 saplings and ended the event with a time for fellowship in St Bonaventure's quadrangle. The ECO team then passed on the baton of environmental service to our neighbouring parish to keep the momentum going.







CELEBRATING CREATION

The Eco Club of St John the Baptist Church, Thane, spearheaded the celebration of the Season of Creation in the parish with the Holy Half-Hour on 1st September. A dry waste collection of old religious articles, old clothes and plastic items was then organised on the 16th and 17th September. An upcycling exhibition-cum-sale "MYSTIC DIY" was held at the auditorium, in collaboration with the Sunday School on 24th September. The children along with their respective class teachers portrayed beautiful posters aimed to raise awareness on upcycling, waste recycling and the efficient use of resources. Children also made articles like coasters, wind chimes, bowls and baskets of newspapers, bird feeders made from plastic bottles or with coconut shells, coloured paper dolls, moving vehicles and musical instruments of paper rolls, created their own indoor games, and wall hangings. All these articles, including the previously collected religious articles, books, and clothes, were sold at a very minimal rate at the exhibition. To end the Season of Creation, Rosary was recited at the grotto of St Francis the Assisi on 4th October.

REUSE 2 REJUVENATE


George D'Mello | Our Lady of Salvation, Dadar West

The audience was regaled by a flute performance as well. Khadija Bakar of St Catherine's gave an impassioned speech on saving the environment followed by a choir recital by its students. Archbishop Felix Machado and Ms Rebecca KKS Kohn of Arigatou International gave out the certificates to trustees Ms Patricia Furtado and Br Joseph Sebastian, and to the headmistress Ms Lizelle Pereira.

The Eco Warriors of St Catherine of Siena School won the award is because of their untiring efforts to clean up Bandstand and the Bandra Promenade. St Catherine of Siena School, Bandra spearheaded the ninth eco-cleanliness drive on the Bandra promenade and Bandstand on 2nd October. Various schools and organisations joined hands with them. The slogan of the group was "Follow the Mahatma for a Clean Bandra." The enthusiasm of the kids was impressive - they scrambled down the steps onto the rocks to do their good deed of picking up the trash so thoughtlessly thrown by others. The reason for their commitment was expressed succinctly by a youngster who said, "I want to save the planet."



JAN KALYAN OUTREACH

In May 2023, the Central line ecology group of MAGIS conducted an outreach program for the tribal children and youths at the Jan Vikas Kendra in Khopoli Village along with the Sisters of the Cross of Chavanod.

We conducted sessions for around 60 participants, taking up topics such as waste management while also highlighting the evils of child labour and child marriage. Through games and different activities, we helped them identify dry and wet waste and also brought home the importance of conserving natural resources.





SHIFT TO THRIFT

The 'Care for Creation' cell of St Peter's Parish, Bandra showcased a unique bazaar entitled SHIFT TO THRIFT which reinforced their mantra of Reduce-Reuse-Recycle. Twenty exhibitors came on board with items that could be reused, scraps of cloth which were ingeniously turned into bags and runners as also papier-mâché Christmas tree hangings.

The purpose was to create an awareness among people of the need to follow the maxim "Less is more". The entrance to the Church was lined with posters depicting various ways we can care for our environment by converting used items such as our old bottles into something useful instead of sending them to the landfills. There was also a colouring event for the children, "Show and Tell" related to segregation of waste. Thirty-six kids were able to describe what they were colouring.

The highlight of the event was a personal encounter with Odette Katrak, co-founder of 'Beautiful Bharat' who addressed the audience and read out her poem – *Less is More*. We also had live demos by D-ERT who showed us how palm fronds, branches etc. can be shredded. A solar panel expert was also available to share his expertise.

This was the start of an ongoing sustainability Campaign in the parish and we are eager to take it to greater heights.

SUPPORTING MOTHER EARTH

Recently, I came across a news item in a Goa newspaper, *The Herald*, titled, 'Earth Our Common Home'. It was an initiative undertaken by the Chicalim Youth Farmers Club in collaboration with the Diocesan Commission for Ecology, Goa. There were various activities to commemorate Earth Day, raise environmental awareness, and pledge support to protect Mother Earth. Such initiatives need to be appreciated.

All such awareness programmes are good, but much more action is needed at the ground level.
